INTRODUCTION

to Studying in Palestine



Studying in Palestine offers a unique opportunity for internationalization and broadening of cultural horizons.



With its rich history and cultural heritage, Palestine offers a diverse and vibrant environment for learning and growth. The country is home to 21 universities and more than 40 colleges, many of which offer diverse study areas that might be of interest to international students and staff who seek inspiring experiences in coping with conflict as well as in building resilient, yet competitive education programs, such as the Gender and Development Studies,

Refugee and Memory Studies, Orientalism Studies, Law Studies, Political Sciences, Documentary Films, Inclusion and the support of marginalized groups research, in addition to the worthwhile engineering, health care, water conservation and sanitation, environmental and agriculture programmes.



The higher education system in Palestine boasts a strong focus on practical, hands-on learning experiences, offering students the chance to apply their knowledge and skills in real-world settings.



Many of the Palestinian universities have strong partnerships with local organizations, allowing for valuable internships and networking opportunities.

Several factors make Palestine an attractive destination for EU students and staff, including:

International Credit Mobility (ICM)

ICM programmes in Palestine offer both staff and students with the opportunity to earn credit toward their degrees while immersing themselves in a new culture. ICM mobilities are available through many bilateral agreements between Palestinian and European universities all across Europe, allowing exchanges in both directions.

Learn Arabic for Foreigners

You can learn different levels of Arabic language courses starting from beginners' level all the way to the certified advanced level with experienced teachers who will immerse you in the Palestinian life and culture and integrating you into campus life.



Cultural Diversity

Palestine has a rich and diverse cultural heritage, providing staff and students with a unique opportunity to learn about and experience a new culture such as the Palestinian folk dance, or Dabke, olive harvest festival, among other cultural activities.

Quality Education

Despite the challenging condition of operating under mobility restrictions on people and goods, many Palestinian universities offer high-quality graduate and undergraduate education, and 5 out of 21 universities appear in the QS ranking among the top 1000 worldwide, 1 in the top 400 – 500 according to the Times





Higher Education (THE) ranking in 2022. Palestine is the winner of the Times Higher Education Asia Award for the teaching and learning strategy in 2020.



Life EXPENSES

Studying in Palestine is often more cost-effective than studying in the neighboring countries, making it an attractive option for EU students and staff who are looking to save money while receiving a quality education.

A few universities offer free accommodation on university owned apartments. We recommend that you contact your host university to inquire about the availability of free accommodation.

Off campus housing, however, costs between 100 – 150 Euros per person per month if you decide to rent a three- bedroom apartment with friends or co-travelers.

Cost for daily meals ranges between 20-50 Euros depending on your dining options.



PALESTINIAN HOSPITALITY

Not only is Palestine known for its wonderfully accommodative environment for foreigners, but also it is famous for its hospitality. Arabs in general and Palestinians are generous and welcome others, be they strangers or not.

So while you are walking through the streets of a village, town or even a city, you are very likely to be greeted by people sitting in front of their shops or houses and invited in with a “tfaddaloo” (meaning “please” in the sense of “come in” or “have a seat”), and it might be repeated once again if you politely refuse. Usually, after the third polite decline of the offer, the host to be will give in and stop repeating their invitation. If you accept, however, the “tfaddaloo” will be followed by an “ahlan wa sahan” (meaning “welcome”) which in turn will be followed by “qahwe willa shay?” (meaning “coffee or tea?”).



The coffee that will be offered to you is most likely Arabic coffee spiced with cardamom. Palestinians tend to drink it “saada”, which means that it will be without sugar, but commonly offer their foreign visitors a slightly sweetened version. The tea usually commonly offer their



foreign visitors a slightly sweetened version. The tea usually drunk in Palestine is, in turn, very sugary and is often complemented with tasty “marramiyye” (meaning “sage”).

Don't be surprised if you are invited to a local's home for home cooked meal or dessert, as well. Say yes! You will be lucky enough to try the very popular and exceptionally tasty

traditional rice dish of “Maqluba”, which in Arabic means “upside down” and refers to the way this meal is being prepared.



The dessert, however, will probably be the well-renowned Palestinian (Nabulsi) Knafeh.



It's a truly delightful dish made of shredded, hair-like phyllo dough, sandwiching a mixture of salty white cheeses. The whole pie is griddled until crispy on both sides, then topped with a sugary simple syrup.





HISTORICAL SITES

to Visit in Palestine

Beyond the learning experience you will have here, there is so much to love about Palestine from our welcoming and inclusive way of life and ancient cultural traditions to our wonderful landscapes and stunning historical monuments. Being home to the most ancient civilizations, and the three monotheistic religions you can be even more immersed in the Palestinian community, which will have a dazzling addition to your experience as an international student in Palestine. Mosques and churches, for instance, are some of the very remarkable monuments you can visit here, such as the Al-Aqsa Mosque. and the Church of Nativity.

There are also the religious sites of the Samaritans. The Samaritans are a religious group in Palestine. They are the only remaining Samaritan community, custodians of the most ancient religious tradition in the country. Their religious center is Mount Gerizim in the vicinity of Nablus City, which Samaritan people consider the holiest place on Earth.

The Monastery of the Temptation is another historical monument you can visit in Palestine. It was built in the 6th century on the slopes of the Mount of Temptation, situated along a cliff overlooking the city of Jericho and the Jordan Valley.




